MS GOBBO: See ya. Hello.

DETECTIVE INSPECTOR O'CONNOR: How are you going? Tanned.

MS GOBBO: That's my latest.

DETECTIVE INSPECTOR O'CONNOR: Oh, jeepers, it's nasty.

MS GOBBO: My latest stress-related injury.

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DETECTIVE INSPECTOR O'CONNOR: Oh, yuk.

MS GOBBO: It's just there. It's very painful. Thank you.

DETECTIVE INSPECTOR O'CONNOR: That's all right.

MS GOBBO: That doesn't feel very weighty, John.

DETECTIVE INSPECTOR O'CONNOR: Oh, I don't know what's in it -
what's in it.

MS GOBBO: I know. But when's he gunna write me something -
when's he gunna write to me and say, "Yes, Nic, we don't
want anything from you ever again. You are now free. A
weight is off your mind."

DETECTIVE INSPECTOR O'CONNOR: Dunno.

MS GOBBO: Do you think I'll ever get that?

DETECTIVE INSPECTOR O'CONNOR: Dunno. I'm not corresponding
with you.

MS GOBBO: I know, I know.

DETECTIVE INSPECTOR O'CONNOR: I'm just the mail boy, as you
said.

MS GOBBO: Fortunately, I think.

DETECTIVE INSPECTOR O'CONNOR: Yeah.

MS GOBBO: So when will you be available to return the post?

DETECTIVE INSPECTOR O'CONNOR: You just ring - ring - ring the number and I'll get back to you.

MS GOBBO: Are you around next week?

DETECTIVE INSPECTOR O'CONNOR: Yeah, yeah, so - - -

MS GOBBO: Yeah. 'Cause I'm seeing a surgeon I saw my [REDACTED] doctor [REDACTED]

DETECTIVE INSPECTOR O'CONNOR: Yeah.

MS GOBBO: And, you know, he's - he's always saying to me that - and I know [REDACTED] is affected by stress but removing yourself from here and being somewhere else and with someone else. That means you don't talk about this stuff.

DETECTIVE INSPECTOR O'CONNOR: Mm.

MS GOBBO: It makes a huge difference. My [REDACTED] medication is halved being away.

DETECTIVE INSPECTOR O'CONNOR: Mm, yeah, you said yesterday when I spoke to you.

MS GOBBO: Yeah, and never before have I seen such an improvement but I think part of it was because I wasn't

with my sister and in the past I've travelled with her.
So obviously we've ended up talking about and
what happened and - so being with someone who didn't talk
about it.

DETECTIVE INSPECTOR O'CONNOR: And what - what part of [REDACTED]
were you in?

MS GOBBO: [REDACTED]

DETECTIVE INSPECTOR O'CONNOR: [REDACTED]

MS GOBBO: Same place I always stay, same hotel. I cry when I
get there, 'cause it's like coming home. I cry when I
leave.

DETECTIVE INSPECTOR O'CONNOR: Yeah.

MS GOBBO: Yeah.

DETECTIVE INSPECTOR O'CONNOR: And the weather was nice?

MS GOBBO: Oh, 34 every day.

DETECTIVE INSPECTOR O'CONNOR: Fantastic. And you come back to
this.

MS GOBBO: Come back to shit.

DETECTIVE INSPECTOR O'CONNOR: Mm.

MS GOBBO: Just - just problems and sources of stress which you don't need.

DETECTIVE INSPECTOR O'CONNOR: Oh, well, hopefully things work out. Give us a ring next week and we'll - - -

MS GOBBO: I will 'cause I'm seeing a - - -

DETECTIVE INSPECTOR O'CONNOR: Once you - whenever it's suitable. Get yourself looked after.

MS GOBBO: Look, I'm seeing a surgeon this [REDACTED] 'cause this needs - - -

DETECTIVE INSPECTOR O'CONNOR: Something done straightaway.

MS GOBBO: and operation, yeah.

DETECTIVE INSPECTOR O'CONNOR: Yeah.

MS GOBBO: Well, the problem with an open wound is that there's a risk of infection.

DETECTIVE INSPECTOR O'CONNOR: Infection, yeah, for sure.

MS GOBBO: It drove me mental over there because, of course - you know how you can't - you can brush your teeth with the water there - - -

DETECTIVE INSPECTOR O'CONNOR: Mm, it's all bottled stuff, yeah.

MS GOBBO: - - - couldn't - well, I couldn't leave it open for a swim or for a shower so I spent a fortune on waterproof dressings but it didn't matter. I don't get fazed by these 'cause I'm used to family, I'm used to it. But I'm a bit disappointed 'cause the last one I had was when mum was dying - - -

DETECTIVE INSPECTOR O'CONNOR: Mm.

MS GOBBO: - - - which was obviously very stressful and I - there's a big gap since then and now I've got another one. But I think that was because of certain things that were going on before I left.

DETECTIVE INSPECTOR O'CONNOR: Right. Well, get yourself fixed up - - -

MS GOBBO: Yeah.

DETECTIVE INSPECTOR O'CONNOR: - - - and undoubtedly I'll hear from ya.

MS GOBBO: Yeah, I'll have a reply Monday, Tuesday, I reckon.

DETECTIVE INSPECTOR O'CONNOR: All right. Take - - -

MS GOBBO: Thanks, John.

DETECTIVE INSPECTOR O'CONNOR: Take care.

MS GOBBO: I will. Have a good weekend.

DETECTIVE INSPECTOR O'CONNOR: I will, I will. Stay warm.

MS GOBBO: Oh, it's freezing. Going from shorts and a T-shirt
to this is awful.
